

Applying Differentiated Instruction Theories in the English Classroom

Behaviorism, Cognitivism, and Constructivism

Case Scenario: Teaching "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry

You are teaching English to a 10th-grade class in with 30 students. The class is reading the short story "The Gift of the Magi" by O. Henry, which explores themes of sacrifice, love, and irony. Your classroom includes:

Your response should demonstrate a clear understanding of each theory and how it can be practically applied to meet diverse student needs in an English language teaching context.
