Past Perfect	Completed action before another	She had left before I arrived.
Past Perfect Continuous	Ongoing action before another	He had been working all day.

- Use **Past Perfect Simple** to show *completion*.
- Use **Past Perfect Continuous** for *duration/emotion/fatigue/etc.*
