Saving the Snow Leopard

The snow leopard is an endangered species, with only 7,000 left in the wild. Some live in the Tost Mountains in Mongolia, where the local community also keeps their animals. Despite only around 15 snow leopards living here, snow leopard attacks on livestock used to be relatively frequent. This was because the leopards occupied the slopes with the best grass, bringing them into direct contact with livestock, including goats, camels and cattle. The locals often killed snow leopards to protect their animals, and, in the 1990s, a conservationist project was set up to try to solve the conflict, benefitting both locals and snow leopards.

A Mongolian teacher, Bayara Agvaantseren, joined this project in 1997. She had grown up nearby and learned about the mountain community and their livestock since she was a child. She understood their perspective because she knew how hard their lifestyle could be, and considered many of them her friends. She had also been enthusiastic about protecting the snow leopard for some time, as she had been working for the Snow Leopard's Trust since the early 1990s.

In an effort to persuade locals not to kill snow leopards, the project team provided them with a kind of insurance. This guaranteed that any animal killed by a leopard would be replaced. In addition, Bayara herself showed locals how to make handicrafts out of their animals' wool to make money from tourists, while others in the team improved the fencing, radically reducing the number of leopard attacks. From the beginning, the locals were pleased with these developments and promised not to react if a snow leopard killed one of their animals.

In 2009, Bayara realised that coal mining in the Tost Mountains was threatening the leopards as their habitat was being lost. She encouraged the locals to get involved in saving this amazing animal, and they set up a political campaign which lasted ten years. For a long time it seemed to be having no effect, but eventually the pressure forced the government to slow mining work. It has now completely ceased, meaning the snow leopards' territory is safe. Bayara recently received an award for her work protecting the snow leopard.

A. The prolonged drought in eastern Australia has driven kangaroos, wombats and koalas to seek food and water closer to urban areas, which has led to an increase in injuries. As well as being hit by cars, native animals are being attacked by dogs or getting caught in fences. Authorities in Melbourne have introduced lower speed limits between dawn and dusk to reduce the number of road accidents.

B. An Australian farmer has moved his cows over 700 km in order to feed them in the extremely dry weather. The local authority in Moyne Shire has given him permission to graze his stock along the roadside. This arrangement means it doesn't need to pay to cut the vegetation, while the owner can feed his animals. Drivers are being invited to stop and purchase fresh milk.

C. A powerful typhoon has slammed into western Japan, causing widespread disruption to flights and public transport. Kansai International Airport was badly affected by flooding, with hundreds of flights cancelled and lengthy queues at check-in. While most businesses remained open, the majority of schools were closed for the day. This may have left students delighted, but parents were put in a difficult situation regarding childcare.

D. A storm moved across Alberta on Sunday, which was more reminiscent of mid-winter than the current season. Over 30 cm of snow fell in some parts. A blizzard caused a bus carrying 16 office workers to slide off the road. Fortunately no-one was injured, although they were late to work. The town has opened a centre for stranded drivers. Organisers of the summer marathon have been forced to call off tomorrow's event. However, the snow is expected to melt within 48 hours.

E. Almost a million people were evacuated along India's eastern coast as the country braced for a severe cyclone. Fearing Cyclone Fani could be the worst since 1999, the government put the country's defence forces on high alert. Over 800 shelters were opened and 100,000 dry-food packets were made ready to be airdropped. Special trains were arranged for tourists to leave popular beach resorts along the coast.
