Recently, companies in the recording industry have begun cracking down on people who download music for free on the Internet. It made the news recently when two dozen college students were taken to court for downloading copyrighted music and movies. Their case is still pending and the outcome is uncertain. It remains to be seen whether this case will have an effect on how and where consumers get their music in the future.

Is downloading a crime? Critics argue that for years, the music industry has churned out mainstream fare that is mediocre and too expensive. Due to downloading, companies are panicking because they are losing their



monopoly on music production. These large corporations are greedy, say critics, and are simply afraid of losing control.

Others argue that the artists and those who produce the products must be compensated fairly for their work. When you download music for free, you rip off the people who make the music by robbing them of their income. Supporters of this argument remind us that unauthorized copying of music is not only unethical—it's also illegal! Not all of the companies making music products are huge corporations, after all. Small companies, which often feature emerging artists, are also hurt.
