The Invention of the World Wide Web

Sir Tim Berners-Lee, an English computer scientist, invented the World Wide Web in 1989 while working at CERN, a physics laboratory in Switzerland. At first, he wanted to create a simple system for scientists around the world to share information and the results of their experiments more easily. The Internet already existed at that time, but it was mainly used for sending emails or accessing limited data. Berners-Lee came up with a new way to use the Internet—he designed a system to link documents together using "hypertext."

Soon, his invention became more than a tool for scientists. It turned into a global and free platform for people everywhere to communicate, cooperate, and exchange knowledge. The World Wide Web allows users to get all kinds of information, such as images, videos, and online documents. It has become an essential tool for researchers, students, and businesses. People can learn new skills, study, watch videos, shop online, and even attend virtual

meetings. The Web is now one of the most important tools in modern life, making the world more connected than ever.
