Essential tips

Part 1

- Decide whether you think it is worth learning a foreign language and state your opinion clearly in the introduction.
- In the body of your essay you need to give reasons to support your argument. Use all of the topics in the notes and put each idea in a separate paragraph. Give examples of why you think (or why you don't think) it is important to learn a foreign language for the purposes of work or travel. You could also consider other people's points of view.

- Make sure you include **your own idea** on a third, related topic and use it to support your opinion. For example, you could say that learning a foreign language is also useful for communicating with friends of other nationalities.
- Summarise your overall opinion in the final paragraph.
- Check the length of your essay, your grammar, spelling and punctuation.

- ▶ Decide which question you can answer best. Do you have ideas and vocabulary for any of the questions?
- ▶ Underline the key words in the instructions.
- ▶ Plan the different sections of your answer and decide on the main point of each paragraph.
- ▶ Spend some time making notes about each paragraph.
- ▶ Make sure your ideas are clearly organised. Every paragraph should be on one topic.
- ▶ Check the length of your answer, your grammar, spelling and punctuation.

Question 2

Use a neutral style. In your introduction you should say briefly what you are going to write about. Make sure you answer the question. Describe your possession in detail. Give some background information to explain what makes it special to you.

Question 3

Use an informal style. Thank Maria for her email and say that you're also looking forward to the English course. In the main body of your email, answer Maria's questions. You could ask Maria some questions, too, for example, does she agree with your choice? In your conclusion, say that you hope to hear from Maria soon. Should you use an informal or formal way to end your email?

Essential tips

Question 4

You are writing for a popular magazine, so the style of your review could be semi-formal. Organise your ideas in paragraphs and make sure you answer all parts of the question. In the introduction, you could describe the film in general terms (What is the film called? What kind of film is it? Who directed it? Who acts in it?). The main body could consist of two or more paragraphs in which you should describe and comment on the plot and the characters. In the conclusion say why you think the film is worth seeing.

Question 5 (for FIRST FOR SCHOOLS candidates only)

The question asks you to think of an interesting character. You don't have to write about the main character. Your letter should be informal.
