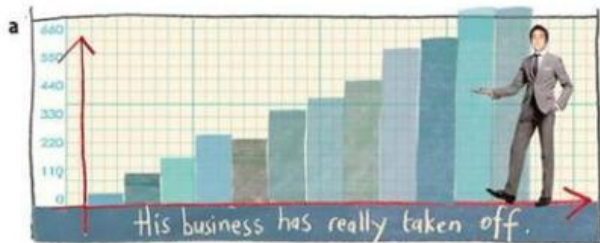


Phrasal verbs: literal and idiomatic meaning
