### **Influenza Vaccines – Grammar & Comprehension**

Seasonal influenza vaccines **is/are** the most effective way to prevent influenza disease, with safe and effective vaccines available/availability and used for more than 60 years. As influenza **evolves/evolved** over time and our immunity to it **wanes/waned**, annual vaccination **is/was** recommended to protect **for / against** influenza.

The most commonly used influenza vaccines are injected inactivated influenza vaccines. These **come/comes** in trivalent and quadrivalent formulations. There **is/are** also high-dose versions for people aged 65 or older.

Influenza vaccines **must/can** be kept at 2–8°C and exposure to light **should/must** be avoided. They are generally administered by needle into the deltoid muscle. The exception **are/is** LAIVs, which are given intranasally.

Inactivated influenza vaccines, such as TIV and QIV, **has/have** an excellent safety profile. Mild reactions are frequent but short-lived. The most commonly reported reactions include mild pain, low-grade fever, headache, **or/and** fatigue.

**Although/However** there has been concerns about egg-based vaccines and allergic reactions, such cases **have not been documented / ddi not document**. LAIVs have generally **been/being** well tolerated in healthy children and adults. Reactions are usually mild.
