# The hotel with no staff

Fiftyone is a luxury hotel in Davos, Switzerland, but owner Tino Morosani says the idea came from budget airlines.

Morosani wanted to change some old apartments into hotel rooms but there was no space for a reception area or a dining room. Then he thought: Budget airlines have automated check-in so a hotel can have automated check-in, too.

Fiftyone is Davos's first 'automatic' hotel. The entrance looks a bit like a multi-storey car park. There are no staff to greet you. You can't book a room using the phone or e-mail. You must book online. Guests check in with a computer outside the front door. When you arrive, you put a confirmation number into the computer and receive an electronic key, which opens the front door.

The hotel has 24 comfortable rooms and each room has a large bathroom, a balcony and free wi-fi. You can buy breakfast from machines: coffee, apples, bread, orange juice, cereal bars and so on.

You can't see the staff at Fiftyone but they are there. They clean the rooms every day and you can phone them if you have a problem.

# Istanbul guide: from the bazaar to the Bosphorus

### **1 Where to stay**

If you are in Istanbul for sightseeing, then you could stay in Sultanahmet or find a small hotel away from the tourist areas.

However, this may not be the best option for the business traveller with a morning appointment on the far side of town. Traffic and distance can be a problem for those on a busy schedule. The challenge is to get the work done, but also find time to discover what makes Istanbul unique.

Many of the city's five-star hotels enjoy a view where you can see lights on the Bosphorus and passing ships.

A visit to the grand bazaar can feel exotic. An afternoon at Hagia Sophia, once a Byzantine church, then a mosque and now a museum, is recommended.

25 But some of the best sightseeing in Istanbul is done with a knife and fork.

There are a large number of restaurants along the river. A Bosphorus meal is a great Istanbul tradition. A meal can include a cold *meze*, then a hot *hors d'œuvre*, followed by a perfectly cooked piece of fresh fish.
