Making pom-poms

What you need

A piece of cardboard, a pen, a pair of scissors, some colourful wool.

What to do

- 1 First draw a circle on the cardboard. Then draw a smaller circle inside the first circle.
- 2 Use scissors to cut out the big circle. Then cut out the inner circle to make a hole in the big circle. You can ask a grown-up to help you.
- 3 After that make another circle, exactly the same size as the first one, also with a hole in the middle, like a ring.
- 4 Next put the two rings together. Tie one end of the wool to join the circles together. You now need to wrap the wool around the rings. Push the other end of the wool through the hole, round the back and through the hole again. Repeat this again and again until all of the cardboard is covered and the hole in the middle is very small.

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You might find it easier to use a large needle.

- 5 Next use your scissors to cut the wool in the middle of the two cardboard circles. Then tie a piece of wool in between the two circles.
- 6 Finally take out the cardboard circles.

What next?

- 20 There are lots of things you can do with your pom-poms.
 - Pompoms look great on top of a winter hat.
 - Join lots of pom-poms together to make a necklace or a headband.
 - Make orange pom-poms at Halloween. Cut eyes, a nose and mouth from black card. Stick these on your pom-poms to make pumpkin decorations.
 - 25 • At Christmas, make white pom-poms. Stick a small one on top of a bigger one to make a snowman.
 - Make something for your pet to play with. Cats love playing with pom-poms.
