Almost everyone spends time imagining different situations while awake. We might close our eyes and think about things that could happen in the future or imagine how past events might have gone differently. These mental moments are usually enjoyable. We often picture ourselves doing something exciting or being in someone else's shoes—perhaps more successful, admired, or happier than we are in real life.

Unlike dreams that happen during sleep, these moments of imagination happen while we're fully awake. Also, we can usually choose the content of these thoughts, which is not something we can do while sleeping. Often, we know that what we imagine probably won't come true, or if it does, it won't be quite as we imagined. Still, some of our thoughts are based on realistic goals. In these cases, daydreaming helps us make decisions, explore possibilities, or plan how to succeed in real life. So, this type of imagination can actually be useful.

Creative thinking often starts with such moments. Artists, authors, musicians, and even scientists or mathematicians often come up with new ideas while letting their minds wander. Albert Einstein even believed that imagination was more powerful than knowledge, as it has no limits.

In the 1980s, research showed that many people daydream about simple, everyday matters. It also revealed that people in jobs with lots of repetition—like truck drivers or night guards—daydream a lot to make their tasks more bearable. More recent brain studies, including MRI scans, have confirmed that imagination boosts activity in brain regions responsible for problem-solving. In this way, thinking creatively while awake helps the brain just like dreaming does during sleep.

Despite the clear benefits, some cultures have viewed daydreaming negatively. For example, during the 1800s, people were often labeled as lazy if they spent too much time imagining instead of working. This idea became even stronger during the rise of factory work, where employees had to repeat the same task again and again without room for imagination or creativity.

Some people argue that spending too much time in an imagined world can be unhealthy. Escapists, for example, avoid real-life challenges by picturing a perfect life instead of facing problems. Research suggests that people who daydream too often may struggle with social connections, and they tend to have fewer—or sometimes no—close friends.
