PASSAGE III

Basketball

Basketball is second only to football in the league of the world's most popular sports. It's now played in 150 countries by more than 100 million people but it is still known as the sport of America as it has the strongest and the most skilful teams. The United States had won the Gold Medal at every Olympics until 1972. In that year they lost to The Soviet Union in a match which was both exciting and full of dispute. After the match both the coach and the players said that they had never had such hard times in any other match before because there were lots of arguments about the decisions during the match and the score.

5 The Aztecs are supposed to have played a game in the 16th century which some people believe to be the precedent of basketball. Players had to throw a solid rubber ball through a stone ring. The modern game, though, was invented in 1891 by a Canadian physical education instructor in the United States. Dr Naismith was faced with the problem of finding an indoor activity to use up the energy of students who had become fed up with gymnastics. Naismith wanted a game which could be played indoors and which emphasised skill rather than strength. Basketball was what he came up with. The original game was played by two teams of nine players and the basket was a peach basket nailed to the wall of the gymnasium. The first game was played in 1892 and the final score was 1-0. It showed that more practice was obviously necessary. But even at the first game there were 200 spectators.

10 There are two levels of basketball in the United States. The college game which is run by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) can attract crowds of up to 60,000 per game. The professional game run by the National Basketball Association attracts even more spectators than the college games. Competition to get into the ranks of the professionals is extremely difficult and out of the thousands college players who graduate every year, less than a hundred are chosen. The rest try their chances in the European leagues as they are very keen on having American players.

15 20 Of course, with a game as popular as basketball, the financial rewards for the top professional players are enormous. The highest paid player in American basketball is Magic Johnson who, at the age of 21, signed a 25-year contract worth \$25 million with the Los Angeles Lakers. Now Johnson has considerable power within the basketball world as well as an extremely high salary. On the day after he criticized the team coach for being traditional and claimed that his training was a real drag, the coach was fired.

25 30 35 Apart from the serious professional game of basketball there is the 'show-business' side, represented by perhaps the best known team, The Harlem Globetrotters. Although their main strength appears to be in comedy and entertainment, their technical skills are breathtaking. They have done more to publicise the game of basketball than anybody else. The team was founded in Chicago in 1927 by Abe Saperstein. After they had won every important title possible, they set out to take basketball to the world. The team has been watched by more than 80 million people all over the world. In 1951 it attracted the biggest ever crowd of 75,000 people.

40 45 Probably Naismith didn't think that basketball would become so popular in the following years. Another point he did not foresee when he invented basketball was the advantage that height would give to players. That was because at that time average height was much less than the average of today. It is true that some top-class players are not particularly tall. Alton Bird, for example, is only 1.73m tall but to be under 2m is generally considered to be on the short side. Even nationalities who are generally thought to be short produce tall men who do well at basketball. An instance of this is the Chinese star Mu Tuh-chu who is 2.25 m tall. The leading Japanese player is Okazama and he is 2.36m tall.
