It's often said that we learn things at the wrong time. University students frequently do the minimum amount of work because they are crazy for a good social life instead. Children often scream before their piano practice because it is so boring. They have to be given gold stars and medals to be persuaded to swim, to take exams or to practise an instrument. But when you are older? Ah, now that's a different story.

At 30 I went to a college and did courses in History and English. Seeing an adult in the class wasn't an extraordinary situation for the teachers, but it was an amazing experience for me. When I was younger, I was forced to study but now learning was a pleasure. During the first year, I was paying, so I was the only one waiting for the tutor impatiently. Indeed, if I could persuade him to spend an extra five minutes in class, it was a bonus, not a nuisance. I wasn't frightened to ask questions and homework was fun not a pain.
