Living with other people can be fun, but it also comes with responsibilities. Carla and her roommate Jason have been living together for three months. At first, everything was easy, but now they are facing some challenges. Carla often has to pick up Jason's clothes from the floor and clean up the kitchen after he cooks. Jason, on the other hand, complains that Carla never takes out the trash or buys groceries.

"I feel like I'm doing everything around here," Carla says. "I always have to mop up the floor and wash up the dishes. Jason just plays video games all day." Jason disagrees. "That's not true. I always hang up my coat, and I sometimes clean off the table after we eat," he says. Still, they both agree that things need to change.

After a long conversation, they decided to make a chore chart. Carla will take the trash out every Monday and Thursday, and Jason will put the dishes away and clean the bathroom. They also agreed to turn off the lights when leaving a room and to be more respectful of each other's time and space. "Living together means we must cooperate," Carla says. "We'll get better at this."
