São sempre iguais para todas as pessoas, isto é, não têm S na 3ª pessoa singular;	I CAN SWIMM YOU CAN SWIMM SHE CAN SWIMM
São sempre seguidos de outro verbo no infinitivo sem o TO!	She MUST STUDY for the test. She MUST TO STUDY for the test.
Nas perguntas, passam para antes do sujeito e nas frases negativas acrescenta-se NOT/N'T	<i>May I go to the toilet?</i> <i>You should not /shouldn't be lazy</i>
CAN: 1. pedir ou dar permissão, 2. fazer um pedido, 3. exprimir capacidade / habilidade no presente	1. <i>Can I use your phone? Yes, you can.</i> 2. <i>Can you close the door, please?</i> 3. <i>You can go to the park, now. / I can speak five languages.</i>
COULD 1. Pedir ou dar permissão (mais educação) 2. Expressar capacidade, no passado	1. <i>Could you close the door, please?</i> 2. <i>He could write when he was six.</i>
MAY /MIGHT 1. Pedir ou dar permissão (educadamente) 2. Possibilidade (alta: May) 3. Possibilidade (menos provável: might)	1. <i>May I use your pen?</i> 2. <i>They may go to Rome.</i> 3. <i>Look at those clouds! It might rain this afternoon!</i>
MUST/MUSTN'T 1. Necessidades 2. Expressar obrigação ou dever moral 3. Expressar proibição	1. <i>I feel sick. I must see a doctor.</i> 2. <i>You must respect your teachers</i> 3. <i>You mustn't run in the corridors.</i>
