Artificial intelligence vs human beings
Four reviews of *My Artificial Intelligence* by Melissa Rose.**Review A**

This book provides a fascinating overview of how artificial intelligence is being used in everyday life. The author explains complex ideas in a very simple way, making it accessible to readers without a technical background. However, I felt the book avoided discussing the ethical problems that AI could cause in the future.

Review B

The writer presents a balanced discussion of artificial intelligence, carefully weighing both its advantages and potential dangers. I especially appreciated the chapter on ethics, which raised important questions about privacy and human responsibility in a world run by algorithms.

Getting your first novel published
We've asked five experienced writers to give some tips on how to go about it.

Writer A

Getting your first novel published is always hard. Publishers these days have to be absolutely convinced that a book will make money before they take it on, especially if they haven't got best-selling author contracted to them or published a series based on the same popular hero.

Writer B

PART 1:

PART 2:
Comparing and Contrasting Photos (minute) / Question about your partner's pictures (seconds)

You will be asked to look at three pictures, choose two, compare them and carry out a task the examiner will ask you to do (talk about two issues related to the pictures). After your partner has finished with their task, you will also have to answer a question about your partner's pictures for about 30 seconds.

- Picture A: A businessperson in a luxury office.
- Picture B: A teacher in a classroom.

Task: Compare the photos and say which situation shows a person who cares more about earning money. Explain your choice.

PART 3:
Mind Map – Collaborative Task (minutes) / Second question (minute) / Reach a decision

The examiner will give you a diagram with a question in the centre. You will have two minutes to discuss the questions and prompts with your partner. There is no need to talk about all the prompts. You will be asked to answer a second question in one minute. After answer it, you will be asked to reach a decision with your partner. There is no right answer.

PART 4:
Individual Task (usually minutes)

The examiner will ask you questions related to the topic you discussed in Part 3. There is not a minimum or maximum number of questions. It usually lasts five minutes. The examiner may ask you to discuss a question with your partner. Use complex language and justify your answers. There is no right answer to any of the questions.
