Identity theft happens when someone uses another person's personal information without permission. Criminals can **authorize** a **purchase** with your credit card, or even open a bank account in your name. Many people do not notice until they see a strange **charge** on their account.

If you become a **victim** of identity theft, you need to **confirm** which actions are yours and which are not. It is important to keep **proof of identification** ready, such as your passport or national ID, when speaking to the bank. This helps them to **deal with** the problem faster.

Sometimes, people discover that their personal details were **exposed** online. When this happens, they may feel **paranoid** about every email or phone call. It is natural to feel nervous, but there are steps you can take. First, **file a complaint** with the authorities. Second, check your accounts often and report anything unusual.

Identity theft is serious, but you can protect yourself. Be careful with your information, never share your passwords, and always check before you **authorize** a payment.
