HOW STUDENTS ADAPT TO ACADEMIC FAILURE

Academic failure is not unusual in higher education. Studies in Australia show that about 40% of students fail at least one course unit during their degree. For many, this is a serious challenge, but most students decide to (1) _____ on and continue their studies. About 70% of those who fail remain at university, even if they need to repeat a unit.

When students experience failure, they often want to (2) _____ up, but many instead try to improve their learning. They may (3) _____ out what went wrong and (4) _____ up information about new study methods. Others begin to (5) _____ down deadlines in calendars to organise their time better.

Exams and assessments eventually (6) _____ over, but the lessons students learn from them can be long-lasting.
