

DAY 1 + 2

a few /ə fjuː/ (*det, adj & pron*)

Example: I have **a few** good friends who always help me.

Example: We need **a few** more chairs for the party.

Your sentence:

able /'eɪbl/ (*adj*)

Example: After months of practice, she is **able** to swim across the river.

Your sentence:

about /ə 'baʊt/ (*adv & prep*)

Example: I have **about** ten dollars in my wallet. (*adv*)

Example: This book is **about** wild animals in Africa. (*prep*)

Your sentence:

above /ə 'bʌv/ (*adv & prep*)

Example: The picture is hanging **above** the door.

Your sentence:

accident /'æksɪdənt/ (*n*)

Example: He broke his leg in a car **accident**.

Your sentence:

accommodation /ə,kəmə'deɪʃn/ (*n*)

Example: We stayed in a small hotel for our holiday **accommodation**.

Your sentence:

across /ə 'krɒs/ (*adv & prep*)

Example: The bank is just **across** the road from the supermarket. (*prep*)

Example: She ran **across** the street to catch the bus. (*adv*)

Your sentence:

act /ækt/ (*v*)

Example: The students will **act** in the school play next month.

Your sentence:

action /'ækʃn/ (*adj*)

Example: I like watching **action** movies with car chases and fights.

Your sentence:

activity /æk'tɪvəti/ (*n*)

Example: Swimming is my favorite summer **activity**.

Your sentence:

actor /'æktə(r)/ (*n*)

Example: He is a famous **actor** in many popular movies.

Your sentence:

ad /æd/ (*n*) (=advertisement)

Example: I saw an **ad** on TV for a new smartphone.

Your sentence:

DAY 3 + 4

add /æd/ (v)

Example: Please **add** some sugar to my tea.

Your sentence:

address /ə'dres/ (n)

Example: Can you write your home **address** on this form?

Your sentence:

adult /'ædʌlt/ (adj & n)

Example: Children need to be with an **adult** when they go swimming. (n)

Example: This book is for **adult** readers, not for kids. (adj)

Your sentence:

advanced /əd'vɑ:nst/

Example: This is an **advanced** English class for students who already speak English well.

Your sentence:

adventure /əd'ventʃə(r)/

Example: Their trip to the desert was a dangerous **adventure** full of new and exciting experiences.

Your sentence:

advert /'ædvɜ:t/

Example: I saw an **advert** in the newspaper for a new English course.

Your sentence:

advertisement /əd'vɜ:tɪsmənt/

Example: The TV **advertisement** shows a happy family eating the new chocolate bar.

Your sentence:

advice /əd'vaɪs/

Example: My teacher gave me good **advice** about how to study for the exam.

Your sentence:

aeroplane /'eərəpleɪn/ (= plane = airplane)

Example: The **aeroplane** flew high above the mountains and landed at the airport on time.

Your sentence:

afraid /ə'freɪd/

Example: The little boy was **afraid** of the dark and didn't want to sleep alone.

Your sentence:

after /'ɑ:ftə(r)/

Example: We usually have fruit or dessert **after** dinner.

Your sentence:

afternoon /,ɑ:ftə'nu:n/

Example: The students often play football in the school yard in the **afternoon** after classes.

DAY 5 + 6

afterwards /'ɑːftəwədz/

Example: We had lunch and **afterwards** we went for a walk in the park.

Your sentence:

again /ə'gen/

Example: I didn't hear you clearly. Can you say it **again**?

Your sentence:

against /ə'genst/

Example: Our team played **against** the best team in the country and won.

Your sentence:

age /eɪdʒ/

Example: At the **age** of 18, people can vote in many countries.

Your sentence:

aged /eɪdʒd/

Example: The club is open for children **aged** 8 to 12 years old.

Your sentence:

ago /ə'ɡəʊ/ (adv)

Example: I moved to this city five years **ago**.

Your sentence:

agree /ə'ɡriː/ (v)

Example: I totally **agree** with your idea about recycling.

Your sentence:

air /eə(r)/ (n)

Example: It's faster to travel by **air** than by train.

Your sentence:

airport /'eəpɔːt/ (n)

Example: We arrived at the **airport** two hours before the flight.

Your sentence:

alarm clock /ə'laɪm klɒk/ (n)

Example: I set my **alarm clock** for 6 a.m. every morning.

album /'ælbəm/ (n)

Example: She keeps all her travel photos in a special **album**.

Your sentence:

all /ɔːl/ (adv, det & pron)

Example: **All** the students in my class like playing badminton. (det)

Example: I cleaned the room **all** by myself. (adv)

all kinds of /ɔːl kaɪndz əv/ (det & pron)

Example: This shop sells **all kinds of** toys for children, from dolls, teddies to trucks, Lego bricks.
