## ► Conditional Sentences Type 1

We use **Conditional Sentences Type 1** for something which is likely to happen in the present or future.

### IF-CLAUSE

If+Present Simple

### MAIN CLAUSE

Future *will*

Modal Verbs (can, may, might, must)

Imperative

*If I like the car, I'll buy it.*

*If you want to get into the museum, you must buy a ticket.*

*If you don't feel well, go to bed.*

### NOTE:

- We can use **unless** instead of **if... not**.  
*We'll go shopping unless it rains.*  
(=We'll go shopping if it doesn't rain.)
- When the **if-clause** comes before the **main clause**, the two clauses are separated by a **comma**.

## ► Time Clauses (Present - Future)

- Time clauses begin with **when, after, before, as soon as, until**, etc.
- When the sentence refers to the present or future, we usually use the Present Simple in the time clause and the Future *will* in the main clause.

### TIME CLAUSE

As soon as I know,

Before I leave,

### MAIN CLAUSE

I'll tell you.

I'll help you with your project.

### NOTE:

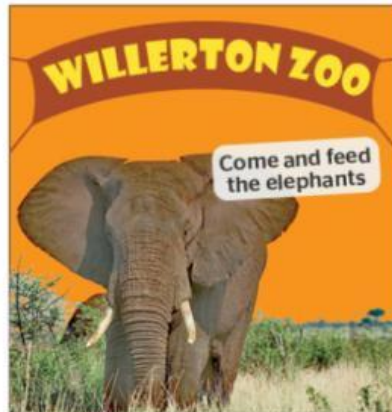
- When the time clause comes before the main clause, the two clauses are separated by a comma.

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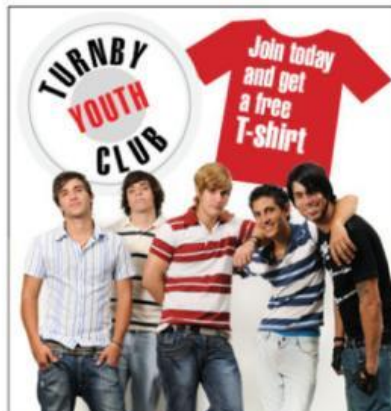

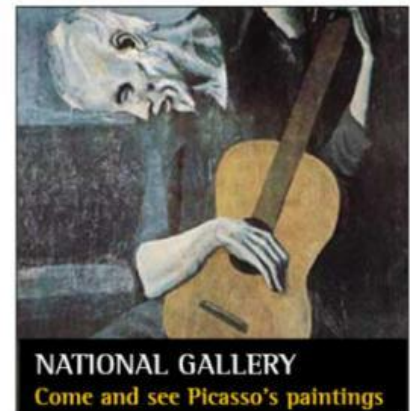
