



The Story of Halloween




Halloween is one of the most popular holidays in the world. Every year, on the night of October 31, people wear costumes, carve pumpkins, and go trick-or-treating. But where did this tradition come from?

Long ago, the ancient Celts in Ireland, Scotland, and Britain celebrated a festival called Samhain. It marked the end of the harvest and the beginning of winter. The Celts believed that on this night, spirits could walk among living people. To protect themselves, they lit bonfires, wore scary masks, and left food outside to please the ghosts.

When Christianity spread through Europe, the Church created a special day — All Saints' Day (also called All Hallows' Day) on November 1. The night before it was called All Hallows' Eve, which later became Halloween.

In the 1800s, Irish immigrants brought Halloween to America. There, people started to carve pumpkins into Jack-o'-lanterns and go from house to house, saying “Trick or treat!” to get candies. Over time, Halloween became a fun celebration for both children and adults.

Today, Halloween is a time for fun and imagination. People decorate their homes with spiders, ghosts, and skeletons, watch scary movies, and enjoy parties. But the old Celtic idea remains — it's the night when the line between the living and the dead becomes thin.


