

Future Tense

Simple Future (Future Indefinite) Tense

The simple future tense is used when an action is promised/thought to occur in the future

Structure: Subject + shall/will + verb +

Example:

- We shall move to another city.
- He will come to New Delhi tomorrow.
- They will make a phone which has artificial intelligence.

In such situations, future continuous tense can also be used if the time of action is defined.

- We are moving to Delhi next week.
- The bus is leaving at 6.00 PM.

Future Continuous Tense

The future continuous tense is used when an action is promised/thought to be going on at a specific time/context in the future.

Structure: Subject + shall/will + be + verb + *ing* . . .

Example:

- I shall be sleeping at around 6.00 AM tomorrow.
- They will be playing at this time tomorrow.
- She will be watching TV when I come home.
- I will be working in the office while you watch a movie.

Future Perfect Tense

The future perfect tense is used to demonstrate an action which is promised to be done by a certain time in the future.

Structure: Subject + shall/will + have + verb in the past participle

Example:

- I shall have completed the assignment by Monday.
- She will have cleaned the house before her father comes.

- Ali will have submitted the tender by tomorrow.
- Before I go to see her, she will have left the place.
- They will have finished making the bridge by January.

Future Perfect Continuous Tense

Note: There is no practical use of this tense.
