THE PYRAMID HOUSE

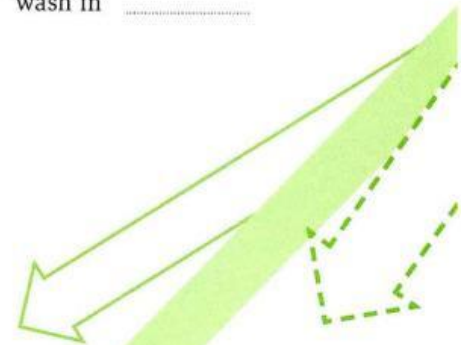
