Use	Example
To ask someone to agree with us	It's confusing, isn't it?
To check whether something is true	You haven't been to prison, have you?
Normal main verbs	Simple tenses • Phil works here, doesn't he? • They didn't leave , did they?
Continuous tenses	• You are coming , aren't you? • They weren't looking , were they?
	Perfect tenses • They've gone , haven't they? • You hadn't seen it, had you?
Be as a main verb	• He's new here, isn't he? • You weren't old enough, were you?
Have as a main verb	• They have a car, haven't / don't they? • You didn't have a shower every day, did you?
Modals	• Jan should be here by now, shouldn't she? • You won't make a mess, will you?
Helpful hints In sentences with <i>I am</i> , we use <i>aren't I?</i> In sentences with <i>I'm not</i> , we use <i>am I?</i> ✓ <i>I'm right, aren't I?</i> ✓ <i>I'm not stupid, am I?</i>	
Watch out! With Let's, we use <i>shall</i> in the question tag. ✓ <i>Let's do the washing-up later, shall we?</i>

Will



- 1 We use **will** to say what we know or think about the future. **Will** here has a neutral meaning. It does not express the idea that we have already decided to do something or that we are planning something.
 - 2 We also use **will** for an instant decision, when we decide on something or agree to do it more or less at the moment of speaking.
 - I'm thirsty. I think I'll **make** some tea.*
 - NOT I-make-some-tea.*
 - You've left your computer on. ~ Oh, I'll **go** and switch it off.*
 - We must celebrate. I know, we'll **have** a party.*
 - I don't think I'll **do** any work tonight. I'm too tired.*
- We also use it to order things.
- I'll **have** the ham salad, please.*
- We also use **will** in offers and invitations:
- Offer: *I'll **peel** the potatoes. ~ Oh, thank you.*
- Invitation: ***Will** you **come** to lunch? ~ Yes, thank you. I'd love to.*
- Promise: *I'll **pay** you back next week.*
