

Fake AI videos have a new generation loving 1980s life | FMT

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NEW YORK: "The 1980s are calling," says a teenager with an old-style haircut. In the background, a rock song called "Everybody Wants to Rule the World" by Tears for Fears plays. This song was popular in the 1980s.

But this video isn't real. It was made by a computer program called artificial intelligence, or AI for short. The fake video got more than 600,000 "likes" on Instagram. This is part of something called "AI nostalgia." Nostalgia means missing old times. This can be confusing for people who really lived in the 1980s.

There's an Instagram account called Maximal Nostalgia that makes lots of videos like this. They show a perfect, dreamy version of the 1980s and 1990s. Everything looks soft and beautiful, like in a fairy tale.

These videos are made using special computer programs. Some are called OpenAI's Sora, Google's Veo, and Luma AI's Ray. These programs can make videos that look very real. At first, it's hard to tell they're fake. They look like real videos from long ago.

People on Instagram, TikTok, and YouTube use these computer programs to look back at old times. They show young people from before smartphones existed. In these videos, kids spend more time outside and talk to each other face-to-face instead of looking at phones.

One person making these videos is Tavaius Dawson. He's 26 years old and runs the Maximal Nostalgia account. But Tavaius wasn't even born in the 1980s!

"People who were born when smartphones and social media already existed kind of wish they'd lived in a time when they didn't have to worry about this stuff," Dawson told a news reporter.

'Rose-coloured glasses'

Someone who really lived in the 1980s might notice that some things in the videos are wrong. For example, New York City didn't have bike lanes back then like it does now.

But young people who were born much later really like these videos about the 1980s. The videos show peaceful neighbourhoods and city streets. They look like happy movies from that time period.

Other accounts like Maximal Nostalgia include Purest Nostalgia and utopic.dreamer. They all show the same kind of perfect world.

But the videos don't show the bad things that really happened in the 1980s. Back then, there were problems like people getting very sick from AIDS, and some people were addicted to dangerous drugs. The videos also don't show that some people were very poor whilst others were very rich.

Instead, the fake videos show the fun parts of the 1980s. People had big, puffy hair, wore bright clothes, and had big shoulder pads on their jackets.

"You have people look at the 1950s or 1960s through rose-coloured glasses, forgetting a lot of difficult things that were happening at those times," said Anna Behler. She's a teacher who studies how people think. Rose-coloured glasses means seeing things as better than they really were.

"Now, we're seeing the same thing with the '80s," she said. This means lots of people are remembering the 1980s as better than it really was.

Dawson says his videos aren't meant to teach history. He just wants to make people happy.

Even though Dawson has good reasons for making the videos, Anna Behler is worried. The AI videos look so real that people might think they show what really happened in the past. This could "blur the line" between real history and made-up stories.

AI is a very modern technology, but it uses old pictures and videos to make new ones that remind people of the past. This makes people feel comfortable when they're feeling lonely.

"Nostalgia isn't a trick; it's emotional survival," said Simon Parmeggiani. He makes videos for a channel called Neptunian Glitter Ball. His videos also look back at the 1980s, but he adds some fantasy to them.

Alicia West Fancher works selling makeup. She really lived through the 1980s and watched some of these AI videos.

"I teared up," Fancher told the news reporter. This means the videos made her cry happy tears. "It's definitely not a made-up version; that's how it was."

Now Dawson wants to make real videos with real people instead of using AI. He wants to make them look like his perfect version of the 1980s or 1990s.

"One thing we're certain of is that nostalgia doesn't fade," Dawson said. This means people will always miss old times and want to remember them.

Math Word Problems: AI Videos and 1980s Nostalgia

Problem 1: Instagram Likes

The fake AI video about the 1980s got 600,000 likes on Instagram. If another AI video gets 250,000 fewer likes, how many likes did the second video get?

Problem 2: Tavaius's Age

Tavaius Dawson is 26 years old now. The 1980s ended in 1989. If Tavaius was born in 1998, how many years after the 1980s ended was he born?

Problem 3: Social Media Accounts

The article mentions 3 Instagram accounts that make nostalgic videos: Maximal Nostalgia, Purest Nostalgia, and utopic.dreamer. If each account posts 4 videos per week, how many videos do all 3 accounts post together in one week?

Problem 4: AI Programs

The article names 3 AI programs used to make videos: OpenAI's Sora, Google's Veo, and Luma AI's Ray. If a creator uses each program to make 5 videos, how many total videos can they make?

*Solution: $3 \text{ programs} \times 5 \text{ videos} = 15 \text{ total videos}$ *

Problem 5: Decades of Nostalgia

The article talks about people feeling nostalgic for the 1950s, 1960s, and 1980s. If someone born in 2015 watches videos about all these decades, how many decades before their birth year are they learning about? (Count: 1950s = 1950-1959, 1960s = 1960-1969, 1980s = 1980-1989)
