

PRESENT TENSES

- PRESENT SIMPLE : habits , routines , permanent situations + STATIVE VERBS
It can also be used in the future when you talk about timetables and schedules
- PRESENT CONTINUOUS: activities happening now or around now, temporary situations, future arrangements which have been previously organized
It can also be used with ALWAYS to describe behaviour that is repetitive and/or annoying
- PRESENT PERFECT SIMPLE : experiences and recent events, past events with results in the present
It can also be used when the specific time is not mentioned or not known
Used with words such as: already, just, yet, for, since, ever, never
- PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS ; events which focus on the duration of an activity from the past until the present. Frequently used words: for, since, still, all day/night, these days/weeks, etc

NARRATIVE TENSES

- PAST SIMPLE ; short completed actions in the past
- PAST CONTINUOUS: activities which were in progress in a specific time in the past
- PAST PERFECT: past actions which happened before another action in the past
- PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS: a past action which had been in progress up to a specific time in the past

FUTURE TENSES

- FUTURE TIME CLAUSES: After words such as AS SOON AS/WHEN/IF/ AFTER/BEFORE/UNTIL + present simple tense to refer to future time situations
