Faking it

In time, I began to make money from these photos as works of art. But then along came digital cameras and the internet. Suddenly, everyone could make fake photos. And they did. With social media, it became normal to see fake photos everywhere. They became so good that they could fool anyone and everyone. But not me.

My job now is to help people find out if photos are fake. The police come to me for my advice. Newspapers, TV news and sometimes even governments ask me to check whether photos are real or not. The people who fake photos these days are really good and my job is becoming more difficult. But, it pays the bills and I still make my own art in the evenings.
