You never know what the future holds, and while individuals usually manage to get on with things without worrying about what is beyond their control, thinking about all the eventualities is one of the paramount concerns for businesses. In the world of work, uncertainty is concerned with the inability to predict or influence events that may impact negatively on the business. This shouldn't be confused with the term 'risk', which, while similar in meaning, can be assessed, and analyzed in ways that uncertainty can't be, therefore giving businesses the luxury of potentially mitigating any negative consequences. This kind of mitigation is simply not a facet of uncertainty, which is something that can spring from nowhere.

This is not to state that nothing can be done about uncertainty, but usually it's a reactive activity rather than something premeditated. One of the most essential actions businesses can take when encountering a situation of uncertainty is to face it. When some event beyond their control rears its ugly head, rather than shy away from it managers need to roll their sleeves up and prioritize contingency plans, with ideas of what to do in the short and medium term to limit any damage. For example, if trade problems between two countries severely affect a company's exports, it's critical to work on efforts to minimize this disruption. It's not easy of course, and additional business lines around the core of the business may need to be cut adrift, but the most important goal is survival in these circumstances.

Another way that uncertainty can tear through a business is if the company places all its eggs in one basket, or, to put it more simply, has a very narrow service or product offering. Uncertainty can affect any part of a business, ranging from shortages of materials to regional difficulties or whole-industry breakdown, so, where possible, diversification in a company's offerings can be a welcome safety belt to combat the effects of uncertainty.

In our collective minds, the Californian neighborhood of Hollywood is so much more than just a physical location. It's also synonymous with the glitz and glamour of the silver screen, and a dream destination for anyone who wishes to make a name for themselves on the big screen. What is widely considered to be the world's oldest movie industry was established there, but little over a century ago the area was a far cry from its current appearance.

In the late 1800s, the locality was an agricultural community, with the majority of residents being four-legged rather than studio bosses and superstars. Modern 'Hollywood' **came into being** in the early 1900s, when a developer bought the farmland to construct a high-class neighborhood and hotel in addition to incorporating its now-famous name.

At the same time, on the east coast of the USA, the very first movies were being made by inventor Thomas Edison, who had patented the moving-image process. This made it costly or dangerous for other moviemakers to work as they had to either pay expensive fees to Edison or use equipment illicitly in the hope of not getting caught. While many people believe this was responsible for the movie industry's origins in west coast Hollywood, it seems to be far from the only explanation.

In fact, many entrepreneurs realized that California was ideal for moviemaking, thanks to its large open spaces, sparse rainfall, comparatively cheap land and, fundamentally, unlike the east coast, its terrain. It was the perfect backdrop for Westerns, the mainstream genre of the era, highlighting the pioneering spirit of the time. Hollywood was further **heralded** as a movie epicentre when director D.W. Griffiths ventured out to different areas in California to make the first Hollywood movie, 'In Old California'.

By the late 1910s, the principal movie studios had established themselves in Hollywood, and went from strength to strength, even during the Great Depression of the 1930s.

The Bermuda Triangle is a vast, triangular area of the Atlantic Ocean that stretches from Florida to Bermuda via Puerto Rico, and has become known as a much more than just another stretch of sea. The story of the Bermuda Triangle was born the 1950s, when people started noting mysterious disappearances of both ships and planes in the area. It is a moniker so well-known that it also spawned an international hit for irrepressible crooner Barry Manilow in the 1980s.

For many people, the Bermuda Triangle is simply an urban legend, something that sparks the imagination of conspiracy theorists and **sensationalists** worldwide. This perspective is understandable when we look at some of the extraordinary theories that have been expounded on the mystery of the region, theories that, at their most outlandish, include technology from the lost city of Atlantis and a time warp that sucks people into another dimension.

While these ideas might be amusing to entertain, for the majority of people they just aren't credible explanations for the disappearances in the area. This is not to say that there haven't been theories that have held water, especially ones revolving around environmental phenomena such as the changes in the Gulf Stream, an ocean current that can bring strong and sudden weather changes, or simply the number of hurricanes present in that area. Yet, whether we need to explore any more theories is truly open to debate.
