Disposing of waste is one of society's greatest challenges. From plastic food packaging to chemicals used in manufacturing to the vast quantities of electronic waste cluttering up our homes, working out what to do with things we no longer want is often seen as the curse of modern living. It is estimated that, globally, people generate 350 million tonnes of plastic alone per year – double what it was at the turn of the century.

An even more depressing statistic is the amount of this plastic waste that is recycled, a figure that currently stands at a mere 9%, meaning vast quantities of plastic waste are still being sent to landfill. In addition, the latest reports about waste being dumped into seas and rivers make for grim reading to say the least.

Looking on the bright side though, new processes and approaches are gaining ground. In terms of recycling, there are plenty of start-ups throwing technological solutions at the problem (with some measure of success). New robots are powered by software programs that are far better than older recycling plants at sorting materials accurately and in much larger quantities. They are a welcome innovation in an industry that has notoriously tight margins. There are so many glues, inks and other ingredients that are difficult to dispose of that it's no wonder that so many recycling companies go out of business.

Of course, there are a couple of glaringly obvious approaches to disposing of waste. Firstly, companies should change the raw materials they use for biodegradable materials and adjust their processes to produce less waste wherever possible. Secondly, consumers could increase their awareness of the issue and act accordingly

This passage is about toys.

It is always difficult to imagine everyday life in ancient societies, but one subject that has long puzzled archaeologists and historians is the everyday life of children and to what extent it differs from that of children today. There is far less documented about the lives of children in the ancient civilisations such as the Greeks, Romans or Aztecs compared to those of adults. This means that when archaeologists find artefacts that they suspect might be toys, they run into all sorts of difficulties trying to confirm whether their hunches are accurate or simply wild guesses.

For one thing, where an object is found, or its 'context' as archaeologists refer to it, is not always as useful as might be expected. For example, a doll found in a child's tomb may have had a ceremonial function rather than being a plaything. Similarly, children may have played with pots and pans in ancient civilisations in much the same way as they do in modern kitchens, yet finding kitchen utensils in a context connected with children does not count as evidence of this.

The situation is further compounded by the lack of attention from academics as it appears that studying the lives of ancient children has been far down the list of priorities of many. Nowadays, however, interest is growing, and various myths and assumptions are being dispelled. One of these is that, in the civilisations of the past, society had little interest in the lives of children; they rarely played and therefore did not require toys. However, written accounts exist of toys being given as gifts as well as descriptions of the toys that adults and their children played with. Another reliable source of evidence is through illustrations rather than texts. Vases, tombstones and other objects provide a rich source of images depicting children playing with toys, although, again, archaeologists advise caution when interpreting these images.

The pressure that elite sports players are under is almost impossible for us mere mortals to grasp. The fear of hitting a home run, running the hundred meters or taking a penalty shot in front of a crowd of thousands as the cacophonous noise rises up through a stadium is unthinkable for anyone not trained to manage it. And yet, elite sports players willingly put themselves in the spotlight to perform under this kind of pressure week in week out.

To ensure that this pressure does not become overwhelming, a variety of techniques are employed by elite sports people. These days psychology is at the forefront of this preparation. It is vital that athletes are able to stay focussed, practice techniques and hone their skills over long periods of time, and, most significantly, bounce back from defeats. Having strength, pace and ability is not enough for an athlete to reach the top and stay there. Elite sports players need a positive mindset as well as resilience when they face losses or absences due to injury.

Many elite sports players stress the importance of focusing on goal setting and approaching their sport with a personal desire to improve rather than succumbing to pressures from outside, be they from family or society. They take each game as it comes and use defeats as opportunities to learn and improve. The enjoyment that they get from practicing over and over in order to improve is what sets them apart from others, and this contributes to their elite status. They are not concerned with the judgement that comes from the media or fans because they understand how easy it is to let negative talk undermine their confidence.

However, just as physical skills require commitment over time, mental toughness cannot be achieved overnight either. It too
