Cool Jobs: The Tour Guide

1 I'm in charge of organising tours in the Yosemite National Park. I work for a small hotel which offers a variety of activities and experiences for tourists. They include day trips, and, for more adventurous groups, camping trips. We don't use any vehicles for our tours unless our visitors can't walk very far. However, we're hoping to offer horse-riding tours next season. We need to make the tours interesting, so I include talks about the nature and history of the place.

2 I used to work in a high school doing maintenance. I had a permanent contract and a regular salary, but I didn't want to do it forever. I'd always loved nature so I started looking for opportunities working outdoors. I found a great website which listed different job offers in national parks. When I saw a job doing hotel maintenance, I applied straightaway because I had a background in it. After a few seasons doing that, I had the chance to become a tour guide.

3 The main tourist season is from June to August, so I only have a short-term contract. I normally start working in May and finish in late September. The salary isn't amazing, but accommodation and food is included so I don't spend much money while I'm there. I usually manage to save a little, which helps me get through the winter. I get my own room in the hotel and, because I've been working there for several years, I always get the best one! It's got amazing views of the park, so I can't complain.

The Cottingley Fairies

Elsie Wright grew up in a town called Cottingley in the north of England. In 1917, when she was sixteen, her little cousin, Frances Griffiths, came to stay with her. At the bottom of Elsie's garden, there was a pretty stream where the girls enjoyed playing. One day, they came home with wet clothes and their mothers were upset. The girls quickly made up an extraordinary story. They were in the stream because they had seen fairies, or beautiful, tiny people with wings.

In order to show that they were telling the truth, Elsie offered to take a photograph. Her father enjoyed taking photographs in his free time, so Elsie borrowed his camera and took it down to the garden. A little while later, she asked her father to develop the photographs and, sure enough, they showed Frances with a group of fairies in the garden. Her father doubted the photographs were genuine, but her mother believed they were real. She ended up showing the photographs at a talk about fairies in Bradford and people were soon talking about them.

One man in particular, named Edward Gardner, became interested in the photographs. He thought they were proof that fairies existed, so he sent them to a photographic expert who confirmed that the images were real. Not long afterwards, the photographs also attracted the attention of Arthur Conan Doyle, the author and creator of *Sherlock Holmes*. He was planning to write an article about fairies and he wanted to use the pictures to illustrate it.

Despite the popularity of the photographs, Elsie's father still had some doubts. He looked for evidence of the fairies in Elsie's bedroom, but he found nothing. Other people had doubts, too, and over the next few years, different scientists studied the photographs more carefully. While some of them decided they were a hoax, they couldn't prove it. At the same time, the girls continued to amaze the public with more photographs of fairies. When Conan Doyle published them with his article, he thought they would convince everyone that fairies and other imaginary creatures existed.

The photographs stayed in the news until 1921, but after that public interest decreased. The girls, however, continued to live a lie for the next sixty years. They only came clean in the 1980s in a magazine article where they explained how they had copied pictures of fairies from a book. They cut them out and placed them in the garden scenes for their photographs. When they had finished taking the photographs, they destroyed the evidence by throwing the pictures in the stream. The girls had never told the truth because they were afraid of what people would think.
