Modal verbs. Expressing certainty.

Must

Must can be used to say that something seems sure/certain. e.g. *He didn't come to school today. He **must** feel bad. (=I am almost sure he feels bad.)*

Can't

The negative of *must* to talk about certainty is *can't*. e.g. *It **can't** be true. (= It is certainly not true.)*

May / Might

May and *might* are used to say that things are possible – perhaps they are true or perhaps they will happen. *Might* sometimes suggests a smaller possibility. e.g. *It **may** rain later today. I **might** visit a friend tonight.*

May not / Might not

May not/Might not are used to say that perhaps things are not true, or will not happen. e.g. *She **may not** / **might not** be ready.*
