

Space Junk

Our streets are full of litter, the sea is "swimming" in trash and now we're filling up space with rubbish, too! Experts say that there are more than 7,600 tonnes of space junk in orbit around the Earth. How did it all get up there? Well, it mainly consists of old satellites that have broken up, or parts that have detached from existing satellites and space stations. These pieces of space junk may not be very big, but since they move at up to 30,000 miles an hour, they could cause a lot of damage to newer space traffic. So, how will we clean up our space mess?
