As a result of hunting, diminishing food supplies and dwindling territory the number of California condors in the wild numbered just 22 in the early 1980s. Lead poisoning was also a major killer, caused by inadvertently ingesting bullets that hunters left inside dead animals that the enormous birds, which have a wingspan of 9.5ft and weigh up to 25lb, scavenged for food.

Facing imminent extinction, the few remaining wild birds were placed into a captive breeding program in 1987 and slowly released back into the wild starting in the early 1990s. Biologists estimate that the 1,000 and 1,001" chicks hatched in May 2019, but they were only able to confirm their existence over the past several days, because the raptors build their nests inside caves carved into steep, sometimes inaccessible cliffs.

The total living population of California condors now numbers more than 500, with more than half in the wild. The oldest bird being tracked in the condor restoration program is 24, but researchers estimate that California condors can live up to 70 years. They are very gregarious animals who get together in large groups and, like humans, tend to mate for life.

All climbers seeking a permit for Everest must have prior high altitude with looking at the issue of high-altitude safety after one of the deadliest seasons in recent years on Everest, which was blamed on inexperience and crowding near the summit.

The commission's report said that those hoping to climb Everest must have climbed stone Nepalese peak of more than 6,500-meters before getting a permit. Climbers must also submit a certificate of good health and physical fitness and be accompanied by a trained Nepalese guide.

Nepal is home to eight of the world's 14 highest mountains, and mountain climbing is a key source of employment and income for the poor nation. The numbers attempting the climb in May led to bottlenecks in the "death zone", where very low oxygen levels put lives at risk. Oxygen cylinders ran out while as many as 100 people waited in the queue.

A vaccine to protect against chlamydia has moved closer to becoming reality after a pioneering clinical trial found the treatment to be safe. The vaccine successfully provoked an immune response, boosting levels of antibodies against the chlamydia bacterium in the blood and vaginal fluids. About 131m cases of the sexually transmitted infection are diagnosed worldwide every year, and there were almost 220,000 new cases in England in 2018.

Chlamydia can be treated with antibiotics, but infection often has no symptoms and many people are unaware they have it. Without treatment, it can lead to a range of complications for men and women, including fertility issues and an increased risk of HIV

Dr. Frank Follmann, the head of chlamydia vaccine research at Statens Serum Institute in Denmark said the study suggested the injection could provide sufficient protection against chlamydia, without the need for a nasal spray. The findings raise hopes that the vaccine could eventually be given at the same time as the HPV vaccine, which protects against certain cancers including that of the cervix.

The treatment is still at an early stage of development, but the team said the trial results were promising and that testing should proceed to the next stage with a larger number of participants.

More than 50 major UK retails, including Marks & Spencer, Harrods and Iceland, have demanded tax cuts from the government to safeguard the future of the High Street amid intense pressure from online rivals.

Coming as the British economy stands on the brink of recession with the growing likelihood of no-deal Brexit, the retailers warned the strain was increasing on the sector and that greater government support was required.

Brick-and-mortar retailers have faced intense competition from online rivals over recent years, with the proportion of goods bought online rising to about a fifth of all sales. Digital retailers tend to face lower taxes as they occupy less physical space.

The retailers called for a freeze in the business rates multiplier, which is used by the government to raise the tax each year to reflect general inflation. They also called on Sajid Javid to alter a system of business rates relief, which allows firms time to adapt to an increase, to save companies €295m next year.

Retail is the largest private sector employer in the UK, employing approximately 3 million people. The industry accounts for around 5% of the British economy but pays about 10% of all business taxes and about 25% of business rates.
