

FIRST & SECOND CONDITIONAL

First Conditional

Use: Real or possible situations in the **future**. Things that **can really** happen.

Structure: If + present simple, will + base verb

Examples:

- If it **rains**, I **will stay** at home.
- If she **studies**, she **will pass** the exam.



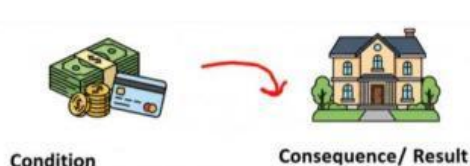
Second Conditional

Use: Imaginary or **unreal** situations. **Unlikely** situations or dreams.

Structure: If + past simple, would + base verb

Examples:

- If I **won** the lottery, I **would travel** the world.
- If I **were** rich, I **would buy** a big house.



- In both conditionals, the order of the sentence can change. You can start with **"If"** or you can put the **"if"** clause in the second part.

Examples:

If it rains, I will stay home. / I will stay home **if** it rains.

If I had money, I would travel. / I would travel **if** I had money.

- **Be Careful with the Comma!**

Correct: If she studies, she will pass.

Correct: She will pass if she studies.

Incorrect: ~~She will pass, if she studies.~~
