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Middletown Book Club

Private Group: 15 members

Welcome to the Middletown Book Club. We meet on the first Wednesday of every month at The Little Book Shop on Abbey Street. The meeting starts at 7.30 p.m. and ends at 9.00 p.m. There is no cost to join the club, but we ask for £5 each week for food and drink.

Each month, you talk about a different book. We tell you what the book is at the start of the month so there are four weeks to read it. The books we choose are always different. It could be a book about a real person's life, a story about faraway planets or a short story about a dog. The idea is to read lots of different types of stories. You can buy the books we read at The Little Book Shop for 20 percent less than the regular price.

Everyone in the club has the chance to choose a book for the group to read. It could be your favourite book – one you've read many times, or it could be a book you want to read. The important thing is that the books give everyone a lot to talk about. There are a lot of ideas online of books for book clubs.

At the Middletown Book Club, we start in small groups. We discuss six questions about the book. We send you the questions before the meeting so you have time to think about them, but don't look at the questions until after you finish the book. Sometimes they tell you what happens at the end!

After the group work, we talk as one large group. Each group shares their best ideas and together we agree on what we liked and didn't like about the book. We usually don't agree, but that's OK!

Everyone over 18 is welcome to join the Middletown Book Club. You can come along to the meeting and introduce yourself there, or you could message us here to let us know that you would like to join us. The Middletown Book Club isn't only about books, it's also about meeting local people and making friends in the area. It's a lot of fun!
