1. Across the world, thousands of languages are in danger of falling silent. [I] Experts estimate that nearly half of the 7,000 languages spoken today could disappear by the end of this century. This is a serious issue because language is more than just a tool for daily communication. It is the heart of a culture, carrying history, songs, and traditional knowledge that have been passed down for generations. [II] Therefore, preserving these languages is **vital** for maintaining human diversity and understanding our past.

[III] Apps and websites are also being created to help new learners practice their heritage languages on their phones. **Unless communities and governments work together to support these programs, these unique voices will vanish forever.** Money and policies are needed to keep these projects running.
