English idioms are expressions that have a meaning different from the literal meaning of the words. For example, the idiom “break the ice” does not mean to break something cold, but to start a conversation.

Idioms are very common in everyday English. For example, when someone says, “it’s raining cats and dogs,” it means it is raining heavily. Learning idioms helps students understand real conversations better.
