Usage: causative verbs

Causative verbs indicate that a subject causes someone else to do something, rather than doing it themselves.

Grammar Reference

Causative verbs

'Get' can be used to express the idea that "X" causes "Y" to do something. 'Ask', 'tell', 'have' can also be used as causative verbs.

FORM:

X gets/ asks/ tells/ wants Y to do something. ↔ **X has Y do** something

E.g. I'll **get** the waiter **to bring** you the menu.

I'll **have** the waiter **bring** you the menu.

Note that 'have' is much more common in American English; 'get' is common in spoken British English.

Key Words

- **heating:** machinery used to keep buildings warm, such as furnaces or radiators :: calefacción
- **work:** do what is supposed to do :: funcionar
- **immediately:** without delay :: inmediatamente
- **fix:** repair :: reparar
- **scream:** make a loud high noise with your voice; shriek :: gritar
- **absolutely:** used to say that you completely agree :: totalmente, absolutamente
- **reasonable:** not too expensive :: razonable (refiriendo al precio)
- **in the vicinity:** nearby; not far away :: cerca
- **temperature:** the measured amount of heat in a place or in the body :: temperatura
- **thermometer:** a device used to measure temperature :: termómetro
- **fever:** temporary increase in body temperature, usually above :: fiebre
- **pills / tablets:** a small, solid, rounded mass of medicine :: pastilla
- **medicine:** a medication, drug, or remedy used to treat illnesses :: medicina
- **vomit / throw up:** the involuntary or forceful ejection of stomach contents through the mouth :: vomitar
- **tummy bug:** a common, often short-lived infection of the digestive system :: virus estomacal
- **headache:** a common, often treatable pain felt in the head, face, or neck, typically manifesting as throbbing, dull, or sharp sensations :: dolor de cabeza
- **sore:** physical pain, tenderness, or discomfort in a body part :: dolorido
- **fluids:** (re medicine) liquids like water, juice, soup :: líquidos
- **prescription:** an official, written, or electronic order from a qualified health professional (like a doctor or dentist) to a pharmacist for medication or a medical device :: receta medica
- **chemist's / pharmacy:** a retail shop or hospital department where medicines are compounded, dispensed, and sold :: farmacia
- **clinic:** a healthcare facility focused on outpatient care, providing diagnosis, treatment, and preventative medicine to patients who do not require overnight stays :: clinica
- **diarrhea:** a common gastrointestinal symptom defined as passing loose, watery stools :: diarrea
- **constipation:** a common digestive issue characterized by infrequent bowel movements, hard or lumpy stools, and difficulty or pain when passing stool :: constipación
- **cold:** a common digestive issue characterized by infrequent bowel movements (typically fewer than three per week), hard or lumpy stools, and difficulty or pain when passing stool :: frio o resfrio
- **cough:** a protective reflex that suddenly expels air from the lungs to clear the throat and airways of mucus, irritants, or foreign particles :: tos
- **queasy / nauseous:** feeling sick in the stomach with an urge to vomit :: con nauseas
- **dizzy:** a sensation of spinning, woozy, or lightheadedness, often with a feeling of instability or a tendency to fall :: mareado
- **flu:** short for influenza, is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs :: gripe
- **blood pressure:** the force of blood pushing against artery walls as the heart pumps it through the body :: presión arterial
- **pain killer:** a medication designed to reduce or eliminate physical pain :: calmante
- **pulse:** the rhythmic, palpable throbbing of arteries produced by the regular contraction of the heart :: pulso
- **infected:** having an infection : contaminated with an infective agent :: infectado
