

TENSES REVISION

Simple Present: I play - He plays
Do you play? - Does he play? (don't / doesn't)
Present Continuous: I am playing
Are you playing. - He isn't playing

1. Simple Present or Present Continuous

- 1 Summer (come) after spring.
- 2 he (watch) TV now?
- 3 My brother (write) a new book these days.
- 4 The bus (leave) at 3pm. It (not/leave) at 2pm.
- 5 I (visit) my cousins this week.
- 6 you always (brush) your teeth at night?

Past Simple: I played - I bought
Did you play? (didn't)
Past Continuous: I was playing
Were you playing? - He wasn't playing

2. Past Simple or Past Continuous

- 1 Anna (cook) dinner while her sister (read) a book.
- 2 As Kate (clean) the house, the lights (go) out.
- 3 What you (do) yesterday at nine o'clock?
- 4 He (play) football when he was young.
- 5 She (wake) up (have) breakfast and (go) to work.
- 6 you (buy) new trainers last week?

3a. Present Perfect Simple

- 1 you **ever** (try) Chinese food?
- 2 They (not / travel) to Egypt **yet**.
- 3 He **already** (finish) her homework.
- 4 They **just** (return) from Canada.

Present Perfect Simple:
I **have played**
Have you worked?
He **hasn't arrived**

3b. Have been/ have gone to

- 1 We **have been / have gone** to Italy twice.
- 2 She **has been / has gone** to London recently.
- 3 Dad **has been/ has gone** to the market. He will be back soon.
- 4 Where is Anna? She **has been/ has gone** to the library to return a book.

Present Perfect Continuous:

I have been playing
Has she been watching?
We haven't been running.

4. Present Perfect Continuous

1. He's so tired. He(play)basketball all morning.
2.he.....(paint) the room **since** Monday?
3. We(look) for a new house **for** three months.
4. Look at her! **She's so dirty.** she(paint) the house?

Past perfect Simple:

I had played
Had you begun?
It hadn't driven

5. Past Perfect

1. He didn't ride his bike because he.....(break) his leg.
- 2.....you.....(do) your homework **when I called** you?
3. By the time we arrived at the station, the train (leave)

6. Future will/future going to

1. Jack promised he **will visit/ is going to visit** me in the afternoon.
2. I am cold. I **will close/ am going to close the window.**
3. Tina **won't buy/ isn't going to buy** a jacket tomorrow.
4. The sky is cloudy. It **will rain/ is going to rain** soon.
