

Point 1: We use **will** to talk about things happening in the future.

1. I **will** see you tomorrow.
2. The meeting **will** start soon.
3. She **will not** be here next week.
4. It **will not** be easy to pass the exam.

Point 2: The negative form of **will** is **will not**, but we often contract this to **won't** in spoken English. However, do not use contractions in formal writing.

1. We **won't** have enough money.
2. She **won't** get home until six.
3. The test **won't** be easy.
4. I **won't** travel this year.

Point 3: We use **will** to express a future action that is immediate.

- **Who will be at the meeting?**
- Everyone will be there.
- **When will it end?**
- I will end at noon, just before lunch.

Point 4: We often use the contraction of will ('ll) in spoken English. However, do not use contractions in formal writing.

1. I'll call you tomorrow.
2. She'll be here soon.
3. They'll give you a call this week.
4. Arnold always says, "I'll be back," in his movies.
