



THE ADVERB

Adverbs of certainty and probability. We can use the adverbs *probably, possibly, definitely, surely, certainly* and *undoubtedly* with *will* to give more information about how sure we are. The adverb generally goes after *will* and before *won't / will not*.

e.g. We'll *possibly* go for a walk this afternoon.
I'll *definitely* see you sometime next week.
They *probably* won't arrive before midnight.
Ana will *surely* help other peers as well.

e.g. Paul is *rather* shy. He doesn't talk much.
I *quite* like tennis, but it's not my favorite sport.
They walked *rather* slowly.
Ana was *pretty* sure she had no problems.

Adverbs of degree are used to show the intensity or degree of something. They can be used before adjectives, verbs, or other adverbs. Common adverbs of degree: *fairly, pretty, quite, rather, scarcely, very*.
