Chess, a famously complex game, has twenty possible first moves. There are 400 possible second moves. In Go, however, there are 361 possible first moves and approximately 130,000 possible second moves. Go is so old that no one knows its exact origin. Historical evidence shows that Go is at least 2,500 years old; the oldest Chinese record of Go mentions that the game was played in 548 BC. That’s more than a thousand years before the earliest records of chess.

The Rules of Go

The rules are simple. The goal is to surround more territory than your opponent.

1. You're given either white or black stones. Black always makes the first move. You and your opponent take turns placing stones on a grid.
2. Each turn, you place a stone on an intersection. Once a stone is placed, it cannot be moved.
3. If your opponent (A) _____ a group of your stones, leaving no empty intersections next to it, those stones are removed from the board and become your opponent's "prisoners."
4. If your stones surround an empty intersection, it (B) _____ your territory and your opponent cannot place a stone there.
