The university is on one campus which covers an area of 100 acres. There are faculties — Humanities, Science and Technology, Social Sciences, Law, and Medicine — and these are divided into departments like Geography, Art History, etc. When you arrive, you can pick up a prospectus and decide which tour you want to go on according to your subject of interest. Your tour will begin with a talk by one of the lecturers, who will tell you more about the courses. All our courses consist of a mixture of formal lectures, seminars in groups of up to twenty students, and at least two tutorials per term, where groups of two or three students have the opportunity to discuss things in more detail with their own tutors. Most courses require students to write a dissertation in their last year.

The tours will show you the halls of residence where students live, the Students' Union where a lot of social events take place, and other useful facilities like the supermarket and launderette.

Our courses all begin in September and most of our students are school-leavers — just four per cent are mature students of 21 and over. At present the university year consists of three terms but we are changing to two semesters in two years' time. We will have a slightly longer spring vacation and shorter summer vacation.

We have separate open days for graduates who want to go on to do a course.
