"Good" adjectives and "bad" adjectives

You can use more than one adjective to describe something or someone as good or bad. It depends on how strongly you feel about them. Look at the diagram below.

lovely (++)	(very) good (+)	OK	(very) bad (-)	awful (--)

The adjectives in the middle are called scale adjectives and give a general description of something. You can use very before them.

The adjectives at the ends of the diagram are called limit adjectives and give an extreme description of something. You can use absolutely before them (but not very).

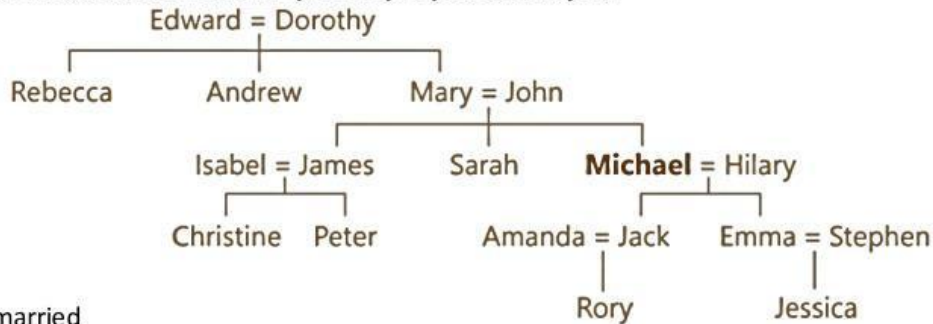

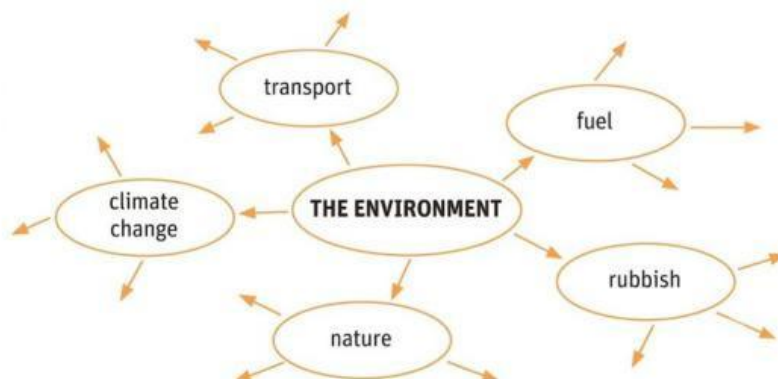

Bird Watching in Colombia

Luis Morales is 18 years old and comes from a tiny village in the Andes Mountains in Colombia. Until seven years ago, one of Luis's favourite activities was to go into the thick forest surrounding his home to hunt and kill wildlife, especially birds. Now, however, he and a group of other local youths work with an international organisation, Wildlife World, to study and protect the birds and their environment.

Wildlife World has set up several of these groups across the area. "The information we get from the children helps us learn how the birds and other animals use the forest, what they eat, and how best we can protect them. The project has been very successful, and we hope to set up more groups in the future," says area leader Felipe Ramos.

Luis is the oldest and most experienced member of his group, having been a member since he was just 11. "Before I joined, I planned to leave the village as soon as I was old enough to go and find work in the city, like most young people do," Luis says. "But now I want to go to university, become a scientist, and return here to carry on working to save these rare birds and their environment. Being part of the group has had a huge effect on me."

Luis also spends time with the younger children in the village. "There is not much to do here after school," he says, "so I try to involve them in our activities. As well as bird watching and nature studies, we also do drama and art. The drama has been particularly successful, and we now have a theatre group of 30 children, which tours the area performing different plays."
