Structure	Example	Use
If + Present Simple, will + V	If people protect forests, endangered animals will survive.	To talk about a possible future result if a condition happens.
Will + V + if + Present Simple	Endangered animals will survive if people protect forests.	The order of the clauses can change without changing the meaning.

Notes

-  The if-clause uses the Present Simple.
-  The main clause uses **will + base verb**.
-  We use the First Conditional to talk about real and possible future situations.
