Text 1

The Rise of the Smartphone

The first smartphone ever made was in 1993 but the first popular smartphone was the iPhone in 2007. Smartphone screens were in colour, and people touched them to choose apps or send messages.

Smartphones improved a lot in the 2010s. The cameras got better, the screens got bigger, the battery life improved and people used social media more and more. Messaging apps became really popular and making phone calls much less popular, but we still call them phones!

So, what can we expect to see in future mobile phones? Mobile phone material will probably be softer, so we can move the phone in different directions to make them bigger and smaller. The phones won't break so easily either. We'll watch things in 3D, and we'll use the phone to control everything in our lives – our heating, our car. Some people do this already, but everyone will do it in the future. If you find it hard to live without your phone now, it'll be impossible in the future!

Text 2

The Past and Future of the Smartphone

Smartphones became really popular with the first iPhone in 2007, but IBM made the very first smartphone in 1993. In 2007, in addition to making calls and sending SMS, smartphones could play music and video, and you could download apps on them. The first iPhone had a battery life of nine hours for internet use and five hours of talk time. It cost £269 with a two-year contract.

Today's top smartphones can cost over £1500. They're bigger than early smartphones, have a better battery life, a bigger memory and more cameras (often four – three on the back and one on the front). People use their fingers or faces to open their phones so other people can't use them.

So, what will mobile phones of the future look like? The material used to make phones will be greener because companies are looking for ways to be more environmentally friendly.

School children will do most of their schoolwork on their phones, and adults will use them even more for their work. No one will be able to live without their phones.
