

Passage: Sharing Responsibilities at Home

In many modern families, running a household requires active cooperation from every member. While one parent often acts as the primary breadwinner who works to earn money and support the family financially, the other may manage daily domestic routines as a dedicated homemaker. Ultimately, working side by side helps strengthen the emotional bond between family members, creating a balanced and harmonious home.
