Natural Wonders Not To Be Missed

If you want to see something that will take your breath away, forget the Sydney Opera House, Golden Gate Bridge or even the Great Wall of China. Look no further than the natural world for inspiration. Here's a selection of must-see places and must-do activities from around the globe.

A The best light show on earth

Aurora Borealis or the 'Northern Lights' is the name given to the extraordinary natural phenomenon of coloured lights seen in the skies of the northern regions of Scandinavia, Alaska and Canada. Often described as the most spellbinding natural firework display, the lights fill the sky with dancing streams of red, yellow, green and violet. Never the same twice, the appeal of the lights is made all the stronger in that their appearance is not guaranteed. The right combination of conditions has to be in place for this magic show to start.

B A plant-lovers' paradise

If plants are your passion, then look no further than South Africa, which is home to about 10 per cent of all known species on earth. The Western Cape includes the fynbos – a unique type of vegetation consisting of thousands of plant species native to the area. So special is the vegetation here that it has been designated as one of the earth's six plant kingdoms. The Cape Floral Region, which includes the iconic symbol of Cape Town – Table Mountain, became a Unesco World Heritage Site in 2004. Among this glorious floral spectacle, one of the highlights must be the 130 species of protea, which come in all shapes, sizes and colours.



C Brilliant bird life, spectacular setting

If your idea of bird watching is waiting for hours on a rainy day to catch a glimpse of a dull, brown bird, think again. The small central American country of Guatemala boasts an incredible range of bird life, all in glorious technicolour. Among the birds is the elusive Resplendent Quetzal, whose courtship and nesting behaviour attract birdwatchers from around the world. And the national parks and nature reserves around Lake Atitlán provide the perfect habitat for the 320 species recorded in the area. The shimmering waters of the lake are surrounded by forests and dominated by the impressive cones of three dormant volcanoes.

D Lend a hand to the elusive panda

If you've only ever seen a giant panda on a TV wildlife documentary, take the opportunity to live alongside one of the world's rarest and most adored animals. Set in the majestic surroundings at the foot of the Qinling mountains, the Shaanxi Province Rescue and Breeding Research Center near Xian in China welcomes volunteers to work with these fascinating creatures. The tasks include monitoring the animals' behaviour, preparing the bamboo which is their staple diet, and keeping their pens clean. Not for the average tourist as the location is pretty remote, but animal lovers could find themselves working with some of the other amazing species indigenous to China such as the Golden Monkey or Crested Ibis.
