In the second part of chapter 4, we will look at the differences between the words **like** and **as**, learn about compound adjectives and, review words related to animals and expressions with the word *time*.

like and as

These words are used to make comparisons—both in English and Spanish—but they are difficult for Spanish-speakers because both words translate to “como”. Here are the differences in use and form:

LIKE ...	AS ...
... can be used as a preposition for comparison or similarity: <i>My bed is so hard it's like sleeping on the ground.</i>	... can be used as a preposition to tell you what job or function a person or thing has: <i>Juli works as a mining engineer. / I used the tin as a cup to drink from.</i>
... is followed by a noun (or a word that functions like a noun—a pronoun or a gerund): <i>like a house / like him / like swimming.</i>	... can be a conjunction and is followed by a subject and verb: <i>You should do as I did and take an umbrella.</i> (OJO: In British English it is becoming more common to hear <i>like</i> followed by a subject and verb. <i>Like</i> followed by a subject and verb is acceptable in American English: <i>I don't speak like he does.</i>
can be used to mean “for example”: <i>Different animals, like gorillas...</i> (See the starred point below.)	Some verbs can be followed by an object + <i>as</i>: <i>regarded as, be known as, describe as, class as, accept as, used as, and treat as.</i>

★ The phrase **such as** can also be used to introduce examples: *Different animals, such as gorillas...*

Compound adjectives

A compound adjective is an adjective which has two parts and is usually written with a hyphen. Many have a present (-ing) or past (-ed) participle in the second part of the compound, as in this example from chapter 4.1: *a thick-billed parrot*.

Here are more examples—note that the first uses the past participle and the second uses the present participle. (1) Who do you think our **four-legged** friends are? (2) What is a **man-eating** tiger?

How would you describe a cat that has blue eyes, **long hair** and a **bad temper**? “Has blue eyes” can be converted to the compound adjective “blue-eyed”. Now, you convert the other two details.

It is a blue-eyed, _____ cat.

Compound adjectives are very useful for describing people, both for character and physical characteristics. (And, as long as you follow the structural rules, you can invent new adjectives—a very useful tool for someone learning a language.) For example: *My mother's a brown-eyed, curly-haired woman. She's left-handed. She's a broadminded and self-confident person.*

Some compound adjectives have a preposition in the second part of the compound. For example: *Where would you sit at a **drive-in** movie?* / *How would you feel if you were **hard-up**?* / *How much money do you need to have to be **well-off**?* Can you think of some more examples?

Finally, the reading activity in the previous lesson included the phrase “20-minute journey”. Note that *minute* is singular not plural. Apply that rule in the exercise below. How would you describe:

- 1) a road which was fifty kilometers long? _____
