Today's goal. By the end of this session you can describe how your educational model works — how students are taught, assessed and grouped, what has changed, and what is required of your staff.

A GRAMMAR IN CONTEXT

When you describe a model, the interesting thing is the system, not the person operating it — nobody wants to know which administrator moderated which grade. That is why almost everything Laura says is in the passive.

1 Active or passive?

Active: focus on the person

Passive: focus on the system

The ministry sets the curriculum.

The curriculum is set (by the ministry).

We assess students twice a year.

Students are assessed twice a year.

The department revised the syllabus.

The syllabus was revised.

→ Use **by + person** only when that information matters. "The syllabus is written by the subject lead" matters. "Students are assessed by teachers" does not — who else would?

2 Which tense?

Tense	Form	Example	When you use it
Present simple	is / are + participle	Students are assessed twice a year.	How it normally works
Past simple	was / were + participle	The model was introduced in 2019.	A change at a point in the past
Future	will be + participle	A new framework will be introduced.	What is planned

→ Most of a model description sits in the **present simple** — it describes what happens every year, not what happened once. The other four tenses appear when you talk about history, change, plans and rules.

3 Irregular verbs you need today

Base	Past	Participle	Example
teach	taught	taught	Subjects are taught in English.
write	wrote	written	The syllabus is written by the subject lead.
set	set	set	The curriculum is set by the ministry.
give	gave	given	Feedback is given every two weeks.
take	took	taken	The exam is taken in Year 11.
choose	chose	chosen	The case studies are chosen by the department.
run	ran	run	The programme is run across four campuses.
